Scholars, practitioners, students and researchers from around the globe will gather in Philadelphia to present and discuss findings on their studies of philanthropy, voluntary action, civil society and the nonprofit sector. There will be (as always) a broad range of sessions and topics covered.

In addition, this year we hope to stimulate a deeper conversation about the pressing question of how these activities

and organizations may support – or fail to support – the development of stronger and more diverse forms of civil society. This inquiry seems well grounded as we meet in the home of William Penn’s “Holy Experiment,” one of the earliest efforts to create a diverse society where people of different religious, ethnic and cultural backgrounds were welcome. Obviously, the challenges in creating such a society remain with us today. Many

people look to nonprofit or nongovernmental organizations – voluntary associations, religious congregations, service agencies, and others – to be primary tools for encouraging and supporting civic discourse as well as addressing social problems. There will be a special track in the conference program devoted to papers that explore these matters.

Participants from all backgrounds, communities and institutions are invited as we welcome a wide variety of voices and perspectives at our Conference. Some scholarship help is available. (More information about financial aid is found at our website.)

### Opening Keynote Plenary & Welcome Reception

THURSDAY EVENING Lynn Huntley, President of the Southern Education Foundation, will give the opening address on our Conference theme, asking us to think more deeply about the obligations of philanthropic institutions to the larger society. Ms. Huntley currently leads one of the most significant nonprofits in the U.S. addressing issues of justice and equity in our education system(s). She was previously a Program Officer with the Ford Foundation, and Asst. US Attorney General for Civil Rights.

Following her address there will be a welcome reception for all, which will include an "Author's Corner" where you can see and hear about the latest books in our field authored by ARNOVA members.

### Second Plenary Session & Reception

FRIDAY EVENING Michael Useem is a Professor of Management at the Wharton School at University of Pennsylvania, and a respected scholar of leadership, decision making, and change management. He will speak about leadership development and succession issues based on recent extensive research on these questions. He will look particularly at those issues now facing nonprofit and nongovernmental organizations.

His talk will be followed by a special reception for Dr. Useem and ARNOVA members sponsored by the Penn School of Public Policy & Practice in honor of their 100th anniversary.

### Third Plenary Session at the Closing Luncheon

SATURDAY Michael Edwards serves as Director of the Governance and Civil Society Program at the Ford Foundation. Prior to that he was the Senior Civil Society Specialist at the World Bank, and spent 15 years as a manager in international relief and development NGOs. He has written extensively about NGOs, civil society and international cooperation.

His most recent book, *Just Another Emperor?: The Myths and Realities of Philanthrocapitalism*, challenges many current assumptions about the roles and values of NGOs. He will address our Conference theme from a viewpoint that represents an alternative perspective on some recent developments in the Sector.

### Teaching Section Pre-Conference Workshop

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 4:00-6:00 P.M. & 7:00-9:00 P.M.

Pre-Conference activities include a panel on Advocacy and Nonprofit Management Education with Philadelphia nonprofit executives and foundation representatives. An evening panel—followed by a dessert reception—will be focused on "Nonprofit Management Education—An Inside View: Continuing the Conversation" from *The Nonprofit Quarterly*.

Registration fees \$20 for section members; \$25 for non-section members; \$15 for students. *All ARNOVA members are invited to this pre-conference workshop.* The goal is to provide practical resources and rich learning for those who teach in our field(s).

ARNOVA's Section on Teaching is planning two sessions during the regular conference schedule. These sessions will focus on "Online Teaching." They will examine the legitimacy of teaching nonprofit management this way, and examine best practices. All are welcome to attend.

### Community and Grassroots Associations (CGAP)

This Section is planning a first Panel session on the topics of "Community Organizing, Civic Engagement and Democracy: Cross-national Perspectives." Much has been written about the shift from an age of government to governance, with community organizations and other non-governmental actors engaged in governing beyond the state. This plenary will examine the potential and limits inherent in this shift from three contrasting perspectives, drawing on empirical research and a range of theoretical perspectives.

Community & Grassroots is also co-sponsoring, with the Theories, Issues and Boundaries Section a second session on "When Social Movements and Electoral Politics Work Together," with a presentation from Frances Fox Piven, Distinguished Professor of Political Science and Sociology, CUNY. Respondents will include leadership from the CGAP and TIBS Sections, and there will be time for questions and discussion.

### The Pracademics Section

A PRE-CONFERENCE EVENT WEDNESDAY, 3-6 P.M. on "Practical Collaborations: How to Establish and Maintain Mutually Beneficial Relationships." This will feature a panel of practitioners from nonprofit organizations in Central Pennsylvania who have worked with ARNOVA researchers on a variety of practical projects. In this work, scholars and practitioners are mutually supportive peers, and expert knowledge is shared through a two-way process. Facilitated table discussions will follow on how to translate the panelists' experiences to other venues.

Two additional sessions in the program from this Section will focus on: *Spontaneous Unaffiliated Volunteering: Breed Unto Itself*; and "What do you have to offer? Using reflective practice to discuss marketing with volunteer organizations."

### Theories, Issues and Boundaries Section (TIBS)

In addition to the session co-sponsored with CGAP (see above), this Section has organized a panel on the question: *Why the Absence of New Theory about Foundations' Role Today in Social Change?* The presenters include James M. Ferris (of USC) and Stefan Toepler, (of George Mason). Session Co-Chairs will be Susan Ostrander, Tufts University; and Kelly LeRoux, University of Kansas.

### Values, Religion and Drawbacks Section (VRADS)

The newest Section of ARNOVA has organized a special Panel on the topic of "Good and Evil in the Nonprofit Sector." Presenters will David Horton Smith (Boston College), Edward Queen (Emory University), Joyce Rothschild (Virginia Tech), and Gil Clary (College of St. Catherine). *Note: This new Section will also host two roundtables at Thursday's lunch, and is planning an open house on Thursday night, hoping to acquaint other ARNOVAns with their interests and plans.*

- ACELA is Amtrak's new ultramodern high-speed train with service between Philadelphia, Boston, New York and Washington, D.C.

**AIRPORT INFORMATION:** For information regarding transportation please go to the Ground Transportation Information desk which is located in each baggage claim area. The Ground Transportation Information representative can assist you by providing you with a list of transportation providers that are authorized to travel to your desired destination. **CAR RENTAL:** All major car rental agencies are located at the airport. To pick-up your vehicle from the Airport, please proceed to Zone 2 outside the baggage claim area.

**DRIVING DIRECTIONS TO HOTEL:** Go north on Philadelphia Airport Rd. Merge onto PA-291/Penrose Ave. Turn left onto PA-291/S 26th Street. Stay straight go onto I-76 W/Schuylkill Expy W. Take 30th Street exit. Turn right on Chestnut Street. Turn left on S. 22nd Street. Turn right on Market Street. Turn right on S. 17th Street.

**TAXI:** Taxi services can be picked up at Zone 5. All Taxi rates are based per trip not per person. Most taxis can accommodate up to 3 passengers. In some cases certain vehicle types can accommodate 4 passengers. \$28.50 Flat Rate from the Airport to the Central Philadelphia Area.

**SEDAN, LIMOUSINE SERVICES AND SHARED RIDE VAN:** Sedan and Limousine services can be picked up at Zone 6 and Shared ride van services can be picked up at Zone 7.

**SEPTA:** The Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA) is the provider of public transportation in

Philadelphia and the Philadelphia area. SEPTA provides numerous bus routes throughout the city, the Market-Frankford line, which serves Northeast Philadelphia, Center City, 30th Street Train Station, and West Philadelphia, the Broad Street line, which runs down Broad street from the Fern Rock Transportation center to the sports complex. ## Other Helpful Information

- **WEATHER:** Temperatures for November in Philadelphia are cool. Monthly average high is 54 Fahrenheit (12 Celsius) and the average low is 39 F (4 C). Jacket, gloves, hat and rain gear are suggested.
- **WHAT TO WEAR:** Attendees at ARNOVA conferences generally prefer business attire. The majority of men wear jackets and ties, while women wear business suits or dresses. Meeting rooms are often cool, so jackets and sweaters are recommended.
- Philadelphia, PA., is in the Eastern Time Zone, five hours behind Greenwich Mean Time and four hours during Daylight Savings Time.
- Sales tax in Philadelphia 7%; hotel lodging tax is 7%.

## Passport/Visa Information

Travelers coming to the U.S. for tourism or business for 90 days or less from the 27 countries in the Visa Waiver Program (VWP) may be eligible to visit the U.S. without a visa if they meet the visa waiver program requirements. The countries participating in the VWP are Andorra, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brunei, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Monaco, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, San Marino, Singapore, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom. All VWP travelers, regardless of age or type of passport used, must present machine-readable passports; previous one-time exemptions for first-time VWP travelers without MRPs ended June 26, 2005.
