John Martinez, Director of Program Development, MDRC

How can public policy research move beyond advancing scholarship to actually improving the lives of low income families and individuals? For the past 40 years, MDRC has been a pacesetter in making research findings accessible to policy makers, government officials, and practitioners so that policy and practice can be better informed by evidence.
