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

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WELCOME

FROM THE ARNOVA CO-CHAIRS

Welcome to ARNOVA's 2019 Annual Conference in San Diego! The theme of this year's conference is *Nonprofits and Philanthropy in a Polarized World: Speaking Truth to Power and Using Power to Speak Truth*. In our call for papers, we challenged the ARNOVA community to grapple with dualisms and the role that our sector plays in identifying and ameliorating dichotomies. We invited you to champion successful bridging and bonding strategies, to courageously speak truth to power, and to continue advancing missions and values for the common good. You responded; and, because you did, we have a vibrant program that will engage us in discussions about the ways in which nonprofit organizations, civil society, and philanthropy can either ameliorate or exacerbate polarization in our rapidly changing world.

Our theme is certainly timely. Indeed, we need only to turn on the television, pick up a newspaper, or look around us to understand the necessity, importance, and complexity of the work that we do as researchers, teachers, and practitioners in the nonprofit, civil society, and philanthropic sectors are undertaking. There is often an expectation that our sectors will catch and support those who slip through the cracks of inequality, fight for the natural resources that sustain us all, and create opportunities for those who face the greatest political obstacles. Undoubtedly, then, the world needs us; and, the work that we do is critically important.

We gather here in San Diego in the heart of the emerging Cali-Baja Binational Mega Region. The Region is home to 6.5 million people, and it is at the frontlines of immigration, climate change, population growth pressures, and stark economic inequality. In the face of these challenges, the Region is leveraging its many existing resources to innovate and model sustainable solutions. Thus, San Diego provides a timely and germane setting for us to discuss how our work speaks truth to power and also uses power to speak truth.

We begin this discussion on Thursday with a lively opening plenary on the Promises and Perils of Philanthropy in a Polarized World. Moderated by ARNOVA Board Secretary and renowned philanthropy scholar René Bekkers, the plenary engages discussion with Kristin Goss (Duke University), Erica Kohl-Arenas (University of California Davis), and Rob Reich (Stanford University). Each of these scholars are making important and different arguments on the roles of philanthropy in democracy.

From our opening plenary on Thursday to our closing session on Saturday, the 2019 ARNOVA conference reflects the importance and the urgency of our work. In total, conference participants can select from 145 panels, 42 colloquia, 3 lightning research roundtables, and 45 posters that are distributed among 15 substantive tracks. ARNOVA continues its ongoing efforts to ensure a welcoming, inclusive community for scholars and practitioners of all backgrounds through robust offerings for professional development including four sessions for emerging scholars and three sessions with journal editors to advise scholars on best practices for submitting papers for review, responding to reviewers' comments, and writing effective reviews. If you are new to ARNOVA, we especially encourage you to explore section colloquies, meetings, and social events as well as the growing number of Community of Interest Groups (CIGs). There are a wealth of opportunities to engage in the vibrant ARNOVA community.

The expansive program offerings at the 2019 conference would not have been possible without the many hours of voluntary service of our ARNOVA members and financial support of our donors. We thank the local arrangements committee, proposal reviewers, session organizers, chairs, and participants. We especially appreciate the dedicated work of the ARNOVA staff for all of their support. To new attendees as well as seasoned participants, we welcome you to the conference and look forward to your engagement in the ARNOVA community.

ARNOVA Code of Ethics

The Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Action (ARNOVA) is a leading interdisciplinary community of people dedicated to fostering, through research and education, the creation, application and dissemination of knowledge on nonprofit organizations, philanthropy, civil society and voluntary action. ARNOVA brings together scholars and practitioners from a wide array of disciplines, fields and backgrounds with both theoretical and applied interests in the day-to-day concerns of third-sector organizations and in the improvement of the work of these organizations and quality of life for the people and communities they serve.

This Code of Ethics focuses on the conduct of ARNOVA members as they serve, represent, engage with and interact within the Association. While the Board of Directors of ARNOVA is empowered to act on behalf of the Association's interests, this code is fundamentally a self-executing ethics document that calls for individual commitment to self-compliance.

The Principles

Principle 1: Abide by Professional Integrity. ARNOVA members strive to promote honesty, transparency, fairness, and respect for human dignity in the scholarship, teaching, and practice of their profession and to avoid professional misconduct or the perception of misconduct.

Principle 2. Strive for Professional Excellence. ARNOVA members contribute to strengthening individual and collective capabilities and support the effective, professional development of others towards excellence in their work.

Principle 3. Respect and Promote Diversity and Seek to Sustain Inclusion. ARNOVA members acknowledge the diversity of the ARNOVA community as an asset and a value. Members treat others with equity, fairness, and respect and work hard for more inclusion within the Association.


Principle 4. Promote a Welcoming Space. ARNOVA members strive to ensure a welcoming and safe space for those with whom they interact, in person or virtually, during ARNOVA activities and governance. Members do not engage in any form of bullying or harassment.

Principle 5. Uphold Full Transparency and Disclosure. ARNOVA members will not engage in actions that reflect improper conflicts of interests and abuse of power within the Association. Members will disclose any interest (financial or non-financial, individual or institutional, private or public) that might constitute a conflict with and for ARNOVA especially when assuming responsibilities within the Association.




- **Jennifer Dodge** is an active member of the Critical Perspective Interest Group and serves as editor of *Critical Policy Studies*, which welcomes critical and interpretive research on nonprofit organizations and civil society. Her research focuses on policy advocacy, deliberation, and conflict in the environmental field.
- **Elizabeth Searing** co-founded the ARNOVA Section on Nonprofit Finance and Financial Management (NPFM) and she is joining the editorial board for *Nonprofit Management & Leadership*.
- **The Institute of Nonprofit Leadership and Community Development (INLCD)** has announced the launch of a new initiative — **Nonprofit University (NPU)**, a 10-month subscription-based training series that focuses on nonprofit administration and management essentials. Executive Director **Pamela Skripak** notes that NPU will complement two other initiatives designed to build a talent pipeline for nonprofits in the region — the Emerging Nonprofit Leadership Accelerator (ENLA) and the Certificate in Nonprofit Management. In addition, the Institute has recently undertaken a community needs assessment focused on board diversity, equity and inclusion, and the barriers that exist to board service by those most underrepresented.

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The School of Social Work (SSW) offers master's degree and two doctoral degrees. Nationally ranked within the top 25 of accredited social work programs we enroll over 500 students and offer the MSW degree, online MSW degree, PhD degree, online DSW, and BA/MSW, JD/MSW, MBA/MSW, MPH/MSW and MSW/PhD combined programs. The MSW and DSW programs have unique and exciting curricula that integrate trauma and human rights perspectives. The Buffalo Center for Social Research (BCSR) is housed within the School of Social Work and provides faculty support in pursuing external funding. The BCSR is also home to the Institute on Trauma and Trauma-Informed Care, Immigrant and Refugee Research Institute, Institute for Sustainable Global Engagement, Institute for Healthy Engagement and Resilience with Technology, as well as the UB/Amrita Social and Behavioral Sciences Research Institute. We have several unique partnerships with the School of Management related to social innovation in the nonprofit and business sectors, including our Social Impact Fellows Program.

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
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
